Ten Years In The Life Of Italy's Slow Wine Guide

"Stories of life, vineyards, wines in Italy," reads the Italian Slow Wine guide subtitle. The 2020 edition is the book's tenth, pages filled with a look back across years that have seen both great changes in Italy and, for the English-language version, a crossing of the ocean so that Slow Wine—thinking wineries in Oregon and California could be included. In celebration, I spoke with the guide's chief editor, Giancarlo Gariglio, about the philosophies behind its launch in 2010, what it looks like now, what the years between have shown, and what new matters are, well, guiding Slow Wine's work into the next decade.
